When Onee-sama crosses paths with “that gentleman”, Shirai Kuroko’s story shall begin!?



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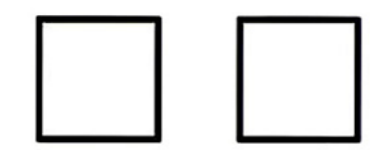

Shirai Kuroko grinned like a bandit—it was a good thing the partition was here so Mikoto couldn’t see it.

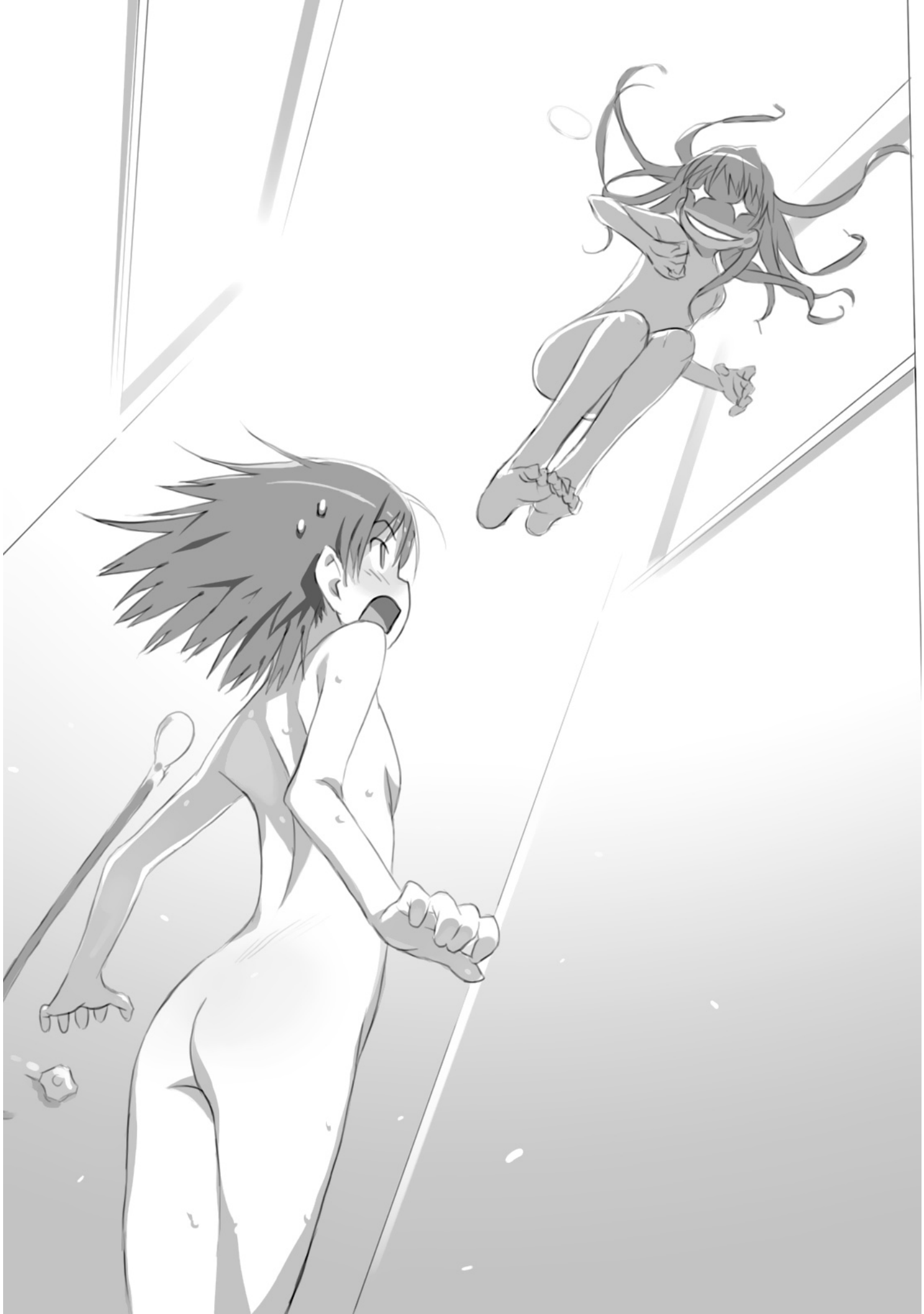

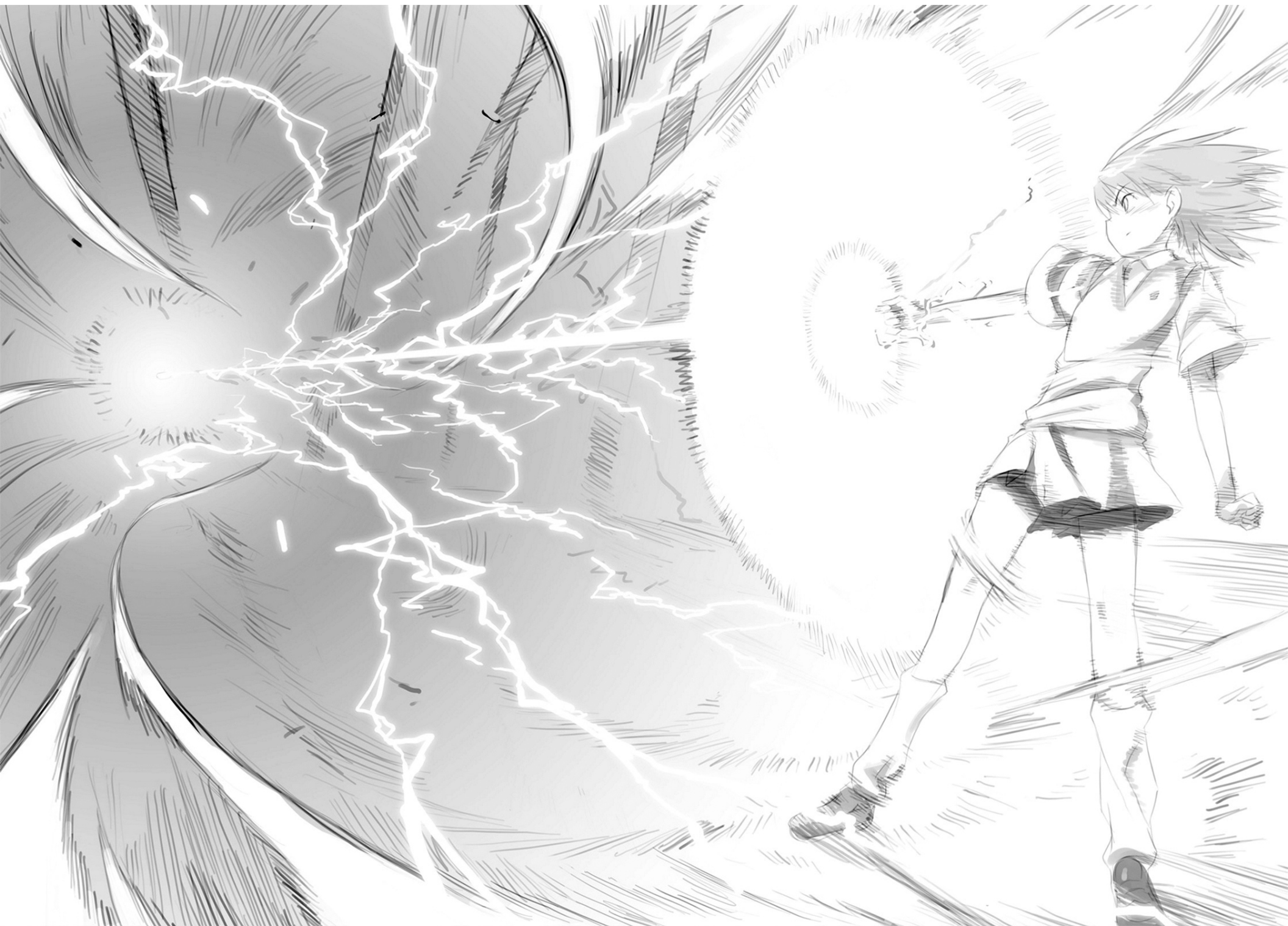
...But she easily crushed that common sense, showing them what the nickname Railgun really meant.
